## Hobbs Estate history tola

By BETH SMITH

estate, located mainly in the Southeast corner of Benton County and overlapping into Carroll and Madison County, is covered with towering pines. These pines, along with the natural beauty of the area is what attracted Roscoe Hobbs to the land in the early 1900's, Charles Hobbs, nephew of the late Roscoe Hobbs told a group of Republican women Tuesday

for use as a wildlife refuge has been a thriving topic in the Northwest Arkansas area lately. The state legislature has made a concerted effort to purchase the property and is currently seeking ways to appropriate money for this purpose.

How did this massive estate come into being? Hobbs attempted to answer this question by presenting its history to the

The first known settler on the land, according to Hobbs, was a man named Peter Van Winkle, who came to the area in the mid 1800's. He, too, was impressed by the massive pine trees on the land and saw an opportunity for a saw mill

his venture and bought a partial interest

in the company.

The business did very well until the Civil War, according to Hobbs. At this time the partners left the area along with the equipment. After the war, they returned to find that the mill had been destroyed. The men began rebuilding the business and, in 1870, Van Winkle sold his share to the Blackburn brothers and went on to other ventures, Hobbs said.

The Blackburn brothers continued to operate the mill until their deaths. The younger brother died in 1918.

Hobbs was vague about the period of ten years between the death of the younger Blackburn brother and the purchase of the land by Roscoe Hobbs in 1928, but told the group the land had been mortgaged to a bank in Springfield, Missouri.

The bank went bankrupt and foreclosed on the mortgage, thus bringing the property up for sale. Roscoe Hobbs bought the property during this period.

Hobbs established a railroad tie manufacturing company on the land and began acquiring more property in the area. After some misfortune in the failure of his first tie making companies. Representative Dick Barclay, who also spoke to the Republican women's group, said the state had been able to negotiate with the co owners of the estate and bring the price down to a little over \$3 million dollars. \$4 million for the property.

Barclay said Gov. Pryor had made a commitment to support the acquisition of the land.

He told the group that on September 1, \$200,000 had been applied toward the eventual purchase of the property. The money was put up by Nature and Conservancy of Arlington, Virginia, a nonprofit group which buys land for preservation. When the general assembl convenes in January, it is hoped they w appropiate money to pay off the note an appropriate other funds for the purchas Barclay said.

Barclay said the acquisition of the estate was one of his main priorities and that he would continue to work toward that goal.

He discussed some of the possible disadvantages of buying the property, but felt that the advantages far outweighed them.


One disadvantage is that the state would lose the \$4,000 in property taxes the estate pays to the state each year.

He also said there had been some apprehension on the part of area businesses in that if the state established a park in the area, it might take business away from the already established tourist

He said he had found through reseach that a state park would probably bring additional business to the area.

Barclay denied rumors that the state was considering building a theme park in the area and said the state was trying to avoid penning down exactly how the property will be used

#### Canal issue important to Crane

With the Panama Canal Treaty making constant headlines across the nation, Benton County residents will have a chance Mar. 9 to hear one of the nation's leading opponents of the treaty.

Rep. Philip M. Crane of the 12th District of Illinois, author of "Surrender in Panama: The Case Against the Treaty," published earlier this year, will be the featured speaker at the Thirteenth Annual Lincoln Day Dinner, to be held at 6:30 p.m. Mar. 9 at the Bentonville High School.

An outspoken conservative, Rep. Crane is the author of two other books, "The Democrat's Dilemma," published in 1969, and "The Sum of Good Government," written in 1976.



In addition, he has contributed chapters to several other major books, including: "Can You Afford This House?" published earlier this year; "The case Against the Reckless Congress," published in 1976; "Continuity in Crisis: The University at Bay," written in 1974; and "Crisis in Confidence: The Impact of Watergate," also in 1974.

In addition to his writings, Crane is rapidly becoming known as a dynamic spokesman of conservatism through personal appearances across the nation. In fact, Crane's speaking schedule is so full this season, that, in order to schedule him at the dinner, it was necessary to hold the event almost a month later than normal, according to Richard L. Barclay, general chairman of the dinner.

"No American should accept the idea that the dream is over," Crane said. His ingredients for the American dream included "the opportunity for a job, upward mobility, increased productivity and job expansion so more people can enjoy their part of the pie."

Crane believes his candidacy and the Republican party can restore people's belief in that dream.

One of the major means for accomplishing this goal, according to Crane, is to stop the federal government's excessive regulation of private

importing oil, like the Carter ad-ministration claims, but because of over-regulation of U.S. businesses, and

Crane recently introduced legislation in the House to prevent the federal government from placing regulations on business that would result in loss of

The native Chicagoan has served in Congress since 1969 and is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, on the health subcommittee and is the ranking Republican on the sub-

He cited Carter's social security plan, which he says will have the average American paying \$6,000 in social security taxes alone by 1987, and Carter's "energy

"What Carter's energy bill amounts to is one big tax," Crane said, adding that it contained no incentive for the production of energy, nor even any plans for con-

## Legislative candidates address Rogers forum

Republican candidates for State Senator and State Representative were featured at a political forum held at Le Marquis Restaurant in Rogers Thursday af-

The forum, which was sponsored by the Benton County League of Women Voters and the Chamber of Commerce Local Government Affairs Committee, was hosted by David Freeman, a member of

Each speaker was allotted eight minutes to present a prepared statement followed by a two minute question and answer session for each. After all had spoken, another fifteen minutes were scheduled for more questions.

The first to speak was Rep. Dick Barclay who is running for re-election as a representative for District 7. Barclay, who was appointed last summer to fill the unexpired term of the late Ivan Rose, began by saying that he feels the most important part of being a good

The first thing I did after being appointed to this position was to set up a full time legislative office here in Rogers," he said, adding that he has received countless number of letters and phone calls that have helped him to keep in touch with the sentiments of his constituency.

Barclay also skimmed over highway problems and what he has done to help. He mentioned his efforts to speed up the Bull Creek project, which was finally completed last month with the help of his prodding. "I have also encouraged the governor to hold regional hearings in Northwest Arkansas concerning the highways," Barclay said.

In addition, Barclay said that if elected he would work for higher teacher salaries, an off-campus site of the Northwest Community College in Rogers and the appropriation of funds in January for the purchase of the Hobbs Estate.

He closed by emphasizing that, in the short time he has been in office. "I have done what I could to bring Northwest Arkansas to the attention of the state by encouraging meetings in the area. I've done the best job that I could to prepare for next year and I'm asking for your help

Following Barclay's presentation, his opponent, Gary Rose, took the floor. Rose, a Rogers pharmacist, said he felt he has the basic requirements necessary to be a representative. "I know that a legislator is required to spend a lot of time away from his family and business. And I have so structured my business in the past that I feel I can do this," he said

He added that he felt a legislator must also understand the needs of the area. "I come across a large cross section of people in my business and listen to both complaints and compliments," he said. Rose also said that he would be accessible to all his constituents just as he has been

In addition, Rose said that a unique problem facing the new legislator will be to help the state decide what to do if the constitutional amendment to eliminate the sales tax from food and drugs is passed. "That's going to leave a \$40 to \$60 million deficit that the General Assembly is going to have to find a solution to," he said. Rose said he recommends streamlining and cutting "some of the fat out of the government" in an effort to rapport with my collegues. make up the deficit.

After Rose's presentation, the two candidates for senator were given a chance to speak. Incumbent Jim Caldwell emphasized that he feels there is nothing more important than the rapport a senator is capable of establishing with his collegues. Caldwell also mentioned his activities concerning the elderly. "I have been active in establishing an aging agency that has made fifteen public hearings across the state to help us determine what the problems of the elderly are so that we can create more effective programs for them," he said. In addition, Caldwell said he chaired a national task force responsible for four major changes in the federal aging program, which he feels will make for better federal programs for the elderly.

Caldwell also said he would like to see a new highway in the area, but realistically, does not feel that funds would be abvailable for another three years. 





The House passed the bill for the Federal Dept. of Education by a very few votes, and by a vote of 224 to 202 the House passed the labor-supported bill to carry out provisions of the Panama Canal Treaty. Hansen (R-ID) with a substitute version eliminating its worst features. At the Fund-raising event in Fayetteville recently, we had an opportunity to get Sen. Baker's reasons for voting for the treaties -- his approval came only after the adoption of his two amendments; one will give the U.S. the privilege of deciding when the Canal is threatened and to def-end it even against Panama; also, to go into the soverign territory of Panama, not just the present Canal Zone. In an ABC-Marris poll conducted 6-18-1979, a national sample was asked, Regardless of how you vote, what do you consider yourself -- a Republican, Democrat, Independent, or what?"
