

State's inmate population growing

The Arkansas Department of Corrections will need a new facility every year to accomodate the growing number of inmates sentenced to prison, David White, spokesman for DOC told the Benton County Republican Wo-

DOC currently operates 14 prisoner housing units throughout the state, White said. But he added that these prisons are at the 6,700 capacity point every

"Our inmate population is growing in excess of one inmate per day," White said. And although DOC may not get a new institution each year, the spokesman said, more bed space is being

One program White said the department is especially proud of is the Boot Camp project, which currently serves 60 youthful, non-violent offenders and is operated much like a military camp.

The project allows qualified inmates to get a break from the general routine of prison farm of feeding inmates. work. White said space will be available for an additional 150 end of the month.

Annual Rogers event shows antiques to best advantage

ROGERS - "You can hear about it, you can read about it. But, you can't visualize it," until you attend the Rogers Antique Show and Sale, its organizers contend.

According to Lilian Stire, coordinator of the show, several booths are set up in the fashion of a rooms in a house. Antique quilts may be used as back drops with furniture, baskets and glassware bringing out that homey feeling.


"When they get set up, it looks like a kaliedoscope of antiques," Stire said. "All of the tables have nice coverings of lace and all of them have beautiful lighting. The dealers are careful to put their merchandise where the lights shine on them. You just can't imagine it until you see it for yourself."

The show and sale, sponsored by the Republican Women of Benton County, will celebrate its 22nd birthday this year.

The show started out in the Rogers National Guard Armory in 1969 with 29 booths. To allow more booth space in the later years, the show moved to the Rogers Youth Center.

Stire said the Republican Women were encouraged to host the first antique show by representatives from the original War Eagle Mill Farm crafts show,

"The War Eagle promotion people were concerned and wanted other things for visitors to see after they visited the arts and crafts fair," Stire explained. Although she only moved here last year the history of the show has been well documented by other members she said. When the Republican Women's show began there was only the War Eagle Fair and an open house at Daisy Manufacturing Museum according to Stire.

She said two of the 33 dealers attending this year, John Eddy of Fall River, Kansas and Margaret Matthew of Rogers, have attended all 21 shows. Eddy deals in primitives and Matthew has depression glass.

Some of the highlights of the show will include

booths packed with silver, dolls and toys, furniture, quilts, jewelry and perfume botttles.

Shoppers need not worry about missing lunch to catch the show. Hungry shoppers may choose a variety of food from the buffet served by the Youth Center.

Show hours are 9 a.m. until 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Sunday.

Dealers from seven states will show their wares at the 22nd Annual Rogers Antique Show and Sale, which will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday at Rogers Youth Center.

The show is sponsored by the Benton County Republican Women's Club, and publicity chairman Lillian Stire said the show will feature dealers from as far away as Wyoming.

The 33 dealers — including two who have been at all 21 previous shows — are expected to display their heirlooms, Stire said. For the first time in saven years, there will be a booth with antique toys and dolls.

Antique silver will be featured by a Russellville dealer who specializes in discontinued flatware patterns, Stire said. Another exhibitor sells books designed to answer questions that collectors of specific items might have. Other

Matthew's husband, Leonard Matthew Sr., died in 1989. Eddy's wife, also named Margaret, died a little over a year ago.

Eddy said he stays active in the business, but considers it a hobby first.

"It's more of a hobby with me than it is a business (now)," Eddy said, adding that with his late wife he had attended antique shows in Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Nebraska, Missouri and Arkansas.

Both veterans warned people to be careful before buying an antique today.

"You do have to watch today, because there are so many reproductions on the market, as to what you buy. And once in a while I get stuck," Eddy said. "You have to be careful that you know the people you're buy-ing from," Matthew agreed. "You have to read antiques publications and buy books, because if you don't educate yourself you'll get stuck. You can hardly get a hold of good primitives this day."

Besides primitives, she boasts many other items, including a carnival glass punch

"I just love old things," Matthew said.

Eddy said he has a few hundred items, picked up from estate sales and individuals. He said he had specialized in pattern glass, now hard to acquire.

"We always have a variety of
